A 14 year old girl rides a horse in the English Grand National Steeplechase.

Barrie, J. M     **Peter Pan, 1911.**

Three children fly to Never-Never Land with Peter Pan, a boy who refuses to grow up.

Baum, Frank L     **The Wizard of Oz, 1900.**

A tornado carries Dorothy from Kansas to the Land of Oz, where she meets the Cowardly Lion, the Tin Woodsman, the Scarecrow and the Wizard.

Bond, Michael     **A Bear Called Paddington, 1958.**

Paddington, a teddy bear found in a London railway station, has a way of bringing mischief and fun to the Brown family.

Brisley, Joyce Lankester     **The Milly-Molly-Mandy Storybook, 1928.**

Short Stories describing the many adventures of Milly-Molly-Mandy.

Burnett, Frances H     **A Secret Garden, 1909.**

Colin's orphaned cousin, Mary Lennox arrives and ends his life as a spoiled invalid.

Butterworth, Oliver     **The Enormous Egg, 1956.**

A young boy is determined to rescue a poor baby dragon who is being used by a group of lazy wild animals to ferry them across the river on Wild Island.

Graham, Kenneth     **The Wind in the Willows, 1908.**

Montgomery, Lucy Maud     **Anne of Green Gables, 1904.**

A lively, independent Canadian orphan gets adopted by a loving family.

Nesbit, Edith     **The Railway Children, 1906.**

When their father is taken away, three children move to the country, where they save the train from accidents.

Norton, Mary     **The Borrowers, 1953.**

Miniature people who live in an old country house by borrowing things from humans are forced to emigrate from

their home under the clock.

Pyle, Howard     **Robin Hood, 1803.**

The story of a legendary outlaw who robs the rich to pay the poor.

Rawlings, Marjorie     **The Yearling, 1938.**

A boy lives a lonely life in the Florida backwoods until his parents unwillingly allow him to adopt an orphan fawn.

Saint-Exupery, Antoine de     **The Little Prince, 1943.**

A fantasy of a prince who leaves his planet and discovers wisdom.

Salten, Felix     **Bambi, 1923.**

A deer grows into a powerful stag in the Austrian forests.

Sewel, Anna     **Black Beauty, 1877.**

A story of a horse who experiences a variety of owners, both kind and cruel.

Sidney, Margaret    **The Five Little Peppers and**

**How They Grew, 1881.**

A family story about the poor and fatherless Pepper children.

Spyri, Johanna    **Heidi, 1881.**

An orphan girl is sent to live with her grandfather in the Swiss Alps.

Stevenson, Robert Louis    **Kidnapped, 1886.**

A boy in 18th century Scotland is kidnapped on orders from his uncle who is after his inheritance.

Stratton-Porter, Gene    **A Girl From Limberlost, 1909.**

Deeply wounded by her mother's lack of sympathy or her aspirations, Elnora finds comfort in nearby Limberlost swamp.

Travers, P. C.    **Mary Poppins, 1934.**

The Banks family acquire a nanny, Mary Poppins, who delights the two children with her tricks.

Twain, Mark    **The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn, 1885.**

**The Adventures of Tom Sawyer, 1876.**

Two adventure stories about a pair of mischievous boys living near the Mississippi River in the mid 1800s.

Verne, Jules    **20,000 Leagues Under the Sea, 1870.**

The fantastic adventures of a sea captain in his submarine.

White, E. B.    **Charlotte's Web, 1952.**

A touching story about a friendship between Wilbur the pig and Charlotte the spider.

Wiggin, Kate Douglas    **Rebecca Of Sunnybrook Farm, 1903**

Rebecca is a spunky girl living in 19th century Maine.

Wilder, Laura Ingalls    **Little House In the Big Woods, 1932.**

Family life in Wisconsin during the 1870's.

Williams, Margery    **The Velveteen Rabbit, 1922.**

The velveteen rabbit is worn out and dirty, but still hopes to find the magic called Real.

Wyss, Johann    **Swiss Family Robinson, 1814.**

The fantastical adventures of a Swiss family shipwrecked on a deserted island.
